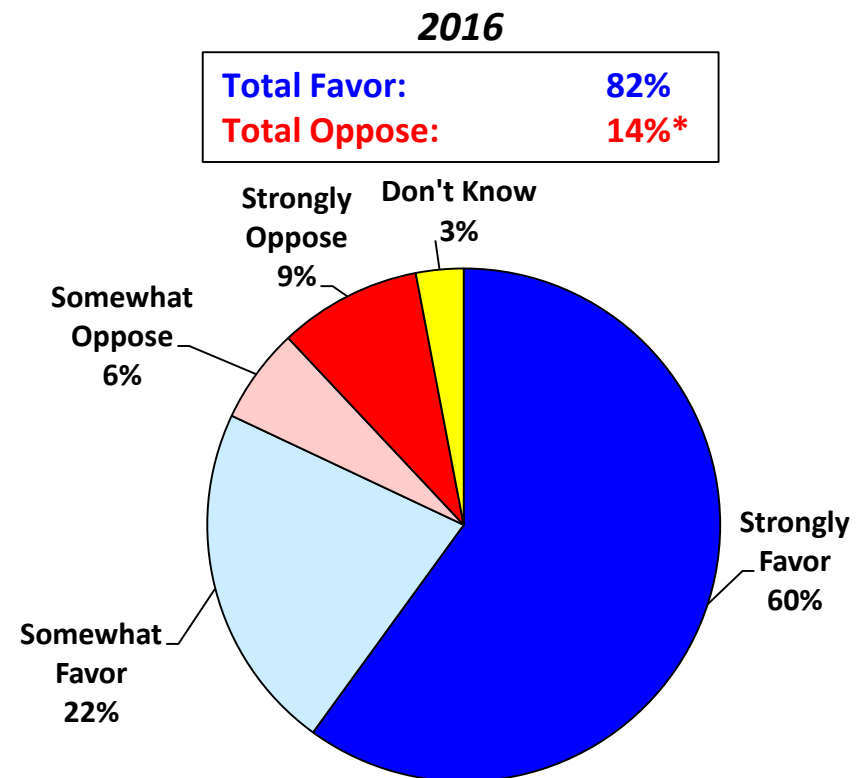
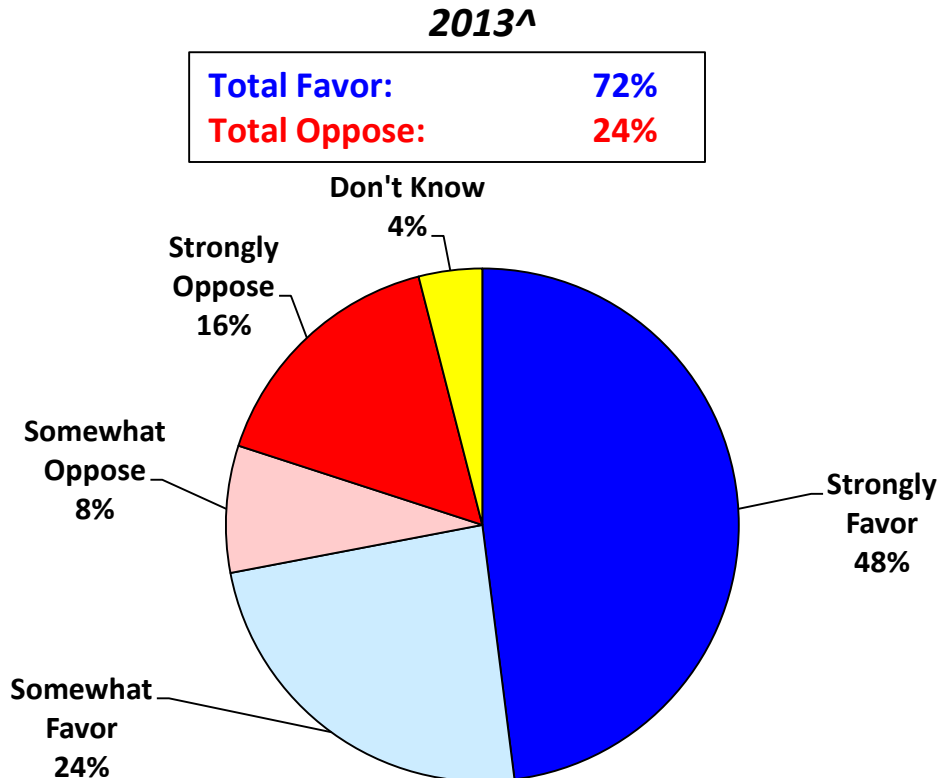


Support for Kansas accepting federal funds to increase access to health care coverage has increased by ten points since 2013.

“Next, I’d like to ask you about an issue being talked about by the State Legislature... Uninsured Kansans earning less than sixteen thousand dollars a year do not have access to any affordable healthcare coverage options. Kansas lawmakers are considering taking action that would provide these low-income residents access to coverage that would include primary care, preventive screenings, diagnostic testing, and cancer treatment services through the state’s KanCare program. The federal government would cover most of the cost to cover these state residents. Do you favor or oppose Kansas accepting the federal funds to increase access to healthcare coverage for thousands of hardworking Kansans through the state’s KanCare program?”

[^]The December 2013 question language was as follows: “Next, I’d like to ask you about an issue being talked about by the Governor and the State Legislature. Under the new federal health care law, low-income Kansans who are uninsured right now could get health care coverage starting in January. The governor and state elected officials can choose to accept federal dollars that have been set aside to cover low-income Kansans, or they can turn the money down and not cover these residents. Beginning in January 2014, the federal government will cover one-hundred percent of the costs through 2016, and then ninety-percent of the costs after that. Kansas would then pay the other ten percent. Do you favor or oppose Kansas accepting the federal money to increase access to health care coverage for thousands of Kansans through the state’s Medicaid program?”
